

John Ross Matheson 1917-2013

The Honourable John Ross Matheson formerly of Gananoque, Rideau Ferry, Ottawa, Brockville, Barrie, Toronto, Kingston, Montreal, and Quebec City; passed away December 27th 2013, The oldest child and only son of Gertrude (McCuaig) and Rev. Alexander Dawson Matheson, John was born in Arundel on November 17th 1917, and raised in Quebec City. He attended Queen's University, graduating in 1940 with a B.A. Honours in Economics. He served in World War II with the First Regiment, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, 1st Canadian Infantry Division. As a Forward Observation Officer, he was wounded near Ortona, Italy in 1943. He married Edith Bickley in 1945, after which John studied Law at Osgoode Hall, graduating in 1948. He later earned degrees from Mount Allison University (Master of Arts), and the University of Western Ontario (Master of Laws). John was appointed a Queen's Counsel in 1967. He also received Honorary Doctorates from Queen's University and the Royal Military College in Kingston. John became Chairman of the Board of Management of Queen's Theological College, held tenure as a University Councillor, and had a founding membership in the Cha Gheill Society, and two decades was on the Board of Trustees. In 1948 John and Edith settled in Brockville, where he was a founding member of the firm Matheson, Henderson and Hart. John was elected Federal Member of Parliament for Leeds in a 1961 byelection. He was re-elected in 1962, 1963, and 1965 and served as Parliamentary Secretary to Prime Minister Pearson. In 1968, he returned to the practice of law and was appointed Judge for the Judicial District of Ottawa-Carleton. In 1979 he moved to the County Court of Lanark, Perth Ontario. In 1985 he was appointed a Judge of the District Court of Ontario and served on the Ontario Court of Justice (General Division) from 1990 to 1992. During his political career, John was the leading member of the parliamentary committee, which arranged the adoption of the Canadian (Maple Leaf) flag by parliament in 1965. Years later, his master's thesis was published under the title "Canada's Flag: A Search for a Country". He also provided the concept and the background research that led to the design of the Order of Canada in 1967. A devoted Mason, he was a member of numerous lodges in Ontario and Quebec and cherished the practice of Freemasonry. Heraldry was another of John's passionate pursuits. He was a driving force in the foundation of the Canadian Heraldic Authority. Proud of his military associations, he held honorary militia appointments of Lt. Col. and then Col. with the 30th Field Artillery Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery from 1972 to 1982. John was named Brockville Citizen of the Year in 1967. In 1993 he was made an Officer of the Order of Canada. In 1999 he was the first recipient of the Distinguished Service Award from the Canadian Association of Former Parliamentarians. He was a Knight of Justice in the Venerable Order of Saint John and a Knight Commander of Merit in the Order of Lazarus. He received the Canadian Centennial Medal, the Queen Elizabeth II Silver Jubilee Medal, the 125th Anniversary of Confederation of Canada Medal, and the Canadian Forces Decoration" adapted from Judge Matheson's obituary in The Ottawa Citizen.

An important part of the Honourable John Matheson's life is **not** indicated above. Judge Matheson was a committed member and executive officer in the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada for more than 40 years. He held the positions of President of the Sir Guy Carleton Branch U.E.L.A.C.; Honourary President of the Sir Guy Carleton Branch, and laterally, Dominion Honourary President for the entire United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada.

John Matheson was responsible for seeing that all his children, and his grand-children became Life Members of the Sir Guy Carleton Branch U.E.L.A.C. He brought a grand total of 21 members into our Branch. John was a cousin to another distinguished member of the Sir Guy Carleton Branch U.E.L.A.C. former Speaker of the House Peter Milliken.

John Matheson's wisdom, his sense of humour, and his dedication to his country, his family, and his friends will be much missed.

Ruliph Ostrom Loyalist

Ruliph Ostrom's great-grandfather, Hendrick Jans Oosterom. came from Schallwyck, Utrecht, Holland, first taking the surname Van Schallwyck ("from Schallwyck") and later reverting to Oosterom. Over the years, spelling of the surname was modified to the simpler "Ostrom". A land grant to Hendrick Jans Oosterom dated 1650 places the Oosteroms in New Netherland, which occupied parts of what are now the Mid-Atlantic States of New York, New Jersey, Delaware and Connecticut, at least that early.

The Ostroms had lived under British rule in the new world for over 100 years when the American Revolution broke out. Ruliph's family was divided in their

loyalties. His three eldest sons supported the rebels, one of them dying in the Revolution. On one occasion when Ruliph was away they stole his horses and some cattle and joined the Revolutionary Army. However, Ruliph remained loyal to the According to written British Crown. testimonials of Ruliph's loyalty, he and his wife sheltered Loyalists from persecution and he acted as a guide and dispatch carrier through enemy lines for the British. One source states that he participated in the Battle of Bunker Hill, although he does not appear to have been a regular in the military. He arranged for other Loyalists to come to Canada, but only arrived himself in 1785. He, his wife Elizabeth Yelverton, one of his daughters and youngest son Daniel, were among the earliest settlers in Sidney Township, Hastings County, Ontario.

Ruliph was 45 years old when he and his family came to Canada to start their life anew. He received significant land grants totalling almost 1000 acres. So busy was he developing his property, he neglected to apply to have his name added to the list of United Empire Loyalists, which would permit each of his children to receive 200 acres of land as Loyalist descendants. His application of 1804 was denied on the grounds that he had already received "adequate grants of land and that, as he had not applied at the proper time, it would be improper to comply with his request." He persisted and in 1808, when he was 68, his petition was granted, which allowed his son Daniel to receive 200 acres of land. Daniel's grant in Nepean, was in what is now the NCC Shirley's Bay Conservation Area. Daniel remained in Sidney Township and there is no record that he actually took up the land.

The settlers were not provided with guns, and predators such as wolves and bears were such a problem that a bounty of £1 was offered per wolf head; £2 for a bear's Ruliph built a trap of logs in a pyramid shape and baited it. The wolves and bears would jump in the small opening at the top but could not climb out. In this manner he is said to have caught 100 wolves and three bears in one season. Ruliph also kept a tavern in Belleville. When Sir Isaac Brock stopped there on his way to defend Niagara during the War of 1812, he picked up Ruliph's youngest grandson and kissed him. The family christened the baby Isaac Brock Ostrom. Dorothy Meyerhof

THE RESTORATION OF THE UEL MONUMENT

The Monument to the United Empire Loyalists is the oldest monument to the Loyalists in Canada. It is located in the United Empire Loyalist Heritage Centre and Park, situated along the historic Loyalist Parkway in Adolphustown, Ontario. It was erected in the old Loyalist Cemetery, established shortly after the first Loyalists to Ontario landed on this site on June 16, 1784. The cemetery contains the graves of many early Loyalists, but unfortunately most of the early burials were unmarked. The monument is a tall granite obelisk mounted on three limestone bases,

located just inside the entrance to the cemetery grounds. It was unveiled on June 16th, 1884 to honour the Centennial of the Loyalists in Ontario who landed at this site and established the cemetery.

Due to its age, the monument is listing and needs to be levelled. The original limestone bases have badly cracked and need to be entirely replaced in order to prevent further damages to this important monument. In addition, the flagstone walkway, installed in 1956, shows signs of heaving due to frost and tree roots, and in many areas poses a tripping hazard to any visitors into the cemetery grounds. This again poses insurance risks to visitors so the entire walkway must be removed and levelled.

The restoration and repairs to the UEL Monument is a joint project by the UEL Heritage Centre and Park and the Bay of Quinte Branch UEL with a planned completion date in 2014. The estimated cost to repair and replace the bases and the surrounding walkways is \$35,000. To date, close to \$20,000 of the cost has been pledged. The scope of this project is beyond the normal financial operations of both the UEL Heritage Centre and Park and Bay of Quinte Branch UEL. As such, we are seeking financial support from our members, various UEL branches, and other individuals, as well as other historic groups to support this important project.


