Become immersed in the fiction, facts and feel of clothing of the time of the Loyalists (late 1700s – early 1800s). Using clothing as a gateway, we can learn about the day to day details of their lives. Clothing can tell us about the people, their heritage, their work, and give us information about their crops and industry. If we choose to do our best to dress as they would have, it may help us to imagine



what it would be like as a 'Loyalist immigrant or refugee' to be in their 'shoes', or petticoat, or cap!

Bring or wear your Loyalist attire to contribute to the discussion! If it no longer fits or if you do not intend to use it again, that's OK. Anne will discuss how it might be improved or altered, starting with how she wishes to improve her own.

And bring your camera to take close-up images of the items and resources you will see!

Anne is a United Empire Loyalist of many ancestors initially from the Kingston and Bay of Quinte area. She is the Central East Regional Vice President, the Genealogist and Acting Secretary for the Kingston Branch. Her parents were each the president of the Kawartha Branch at different times. Her study of Loyalist Clothing developed during teaching Theatre Costuming Design and Construction at Queen's University along with being an active Stage Costume Designer and Stage Manager in Eastern Ontario over the past 20 years. Anne also works as a Regional Manager in the field of Seniors In-home Support with Sweatergang Companions.

A second, hands-on Workshop with Anne is planned for the future at which participants will have access to patterns, supplies and instructions to make their own period clothing.

Report on the Central East Regional Meeting held in Kingston, June 20, 2017 By Rosemarie Pleasant

As the Branch Vice-President, I attended my first regional meeting. It was a pleasure to meet and discuss branch issues with several members of other branches. Many are experiencing similar issues within their organizations, an ageing demographic, the challenge of attracting new and younger members. Changing technologies and the need to communicate and remain relevant to people today. Solutions to various problems were discussed, but there is no simple and universal solution. Another topic of discussion was commercial DNA tests. They are not all the same. The ads on TV depict happy outcomes, but depending on the type can easily mislead. Y-DNA text (paternal matches) is the most effective, haplo groups [ethnicity testing] (Family Tree) estimates are problematic and harmful to the database. GEDmatch can be used to upload results and make connections.

Nancy O'Brien of Bayridge Secondary School had some good suggestions on getting students/teachers interested, especially for the mandated volunteer hours. Some speakers had great ideas for outreach, involving using technology more (On beyond Facebook), getting active on social media platforms and being a positive ambassador/outreach spokesperson for UEL.


Teaching loyalist history is currently on the curriculum of the Manitoba and Ontario school boards, but may be coming off.

Mr. Saylor talked about the common intersections of Quakers and Loyalists, their mistreatment at the hands of the Patriots and their links in Canada. Quakers excelled at record keeping for the time, the women having separate books from those of the men. Quakers, like Loyalists refused to take the oath, faced fines, loss of property and other sanctions. They left the US after the Revolutionary War, often on the same ships as the Loyalists, and settled in some of the same communities, Adolphustown is of particular importance in Loyalist & Quaker history. Some Quakers married out of their community, and were ejected. The Quakers don't meet the legal definition of Loyalists, they were neither Patriots nor Tories. They were just trying to survive those difficult times. Information from their minute books can be used as proof for UEL certificates.

Loyalist Articles in "The Ontario Register" Dorothy Meyerhof - January 2018

"The Ontario Register" (TOR) was published in eight volumes by Thomas B. Wilson, Lambertville, NJ. There were four issues per year for four years from 1968 until 1971. Publication was suspended until 1981. Four issues per year were published in 1981, 1982 and again in 1984. Publication was again suspended from 1985-1989. The eighth and final volume was published as a single issue in 1990. The four issue volumes were later reprinted as single issues for each year. Full indexes of people and places were published for each volume in the last issue of the year or at the back of the single issues. Thomas Wilson himself was the author of many of the articles in the TOR.

In the Sir Guy Carleton Library the TOR has been treated as a Periodical, located on the shelves between "Ontario History" and "The Ottawa Loyalist". Our complete set was made possible by a donation by Ed Kipp.

TOR is a treasure-trove of indexes for births, marriages and deaths from newspapers and church records, along with miscellaneous indexes for land records, etc. Most of the information was taken from microfilms held by the Ontario Archives. Many of these early records could be of interest to those researching their Loyalist ancestors, however, among the various articles are several relating directly to Loyalists.
